Challenges of Distance Learning

As we finish the second full week of Distance Learning and prepare for a third before our next Connection week, we are all learning how to make the best of our instructional days. Here are some thoughts:

Multitasking While Synchronously Learning

I know that managing learners at home during Distance Learning and during Hybrid asynchronous learning is difficult. My family is doing this as well! Our teachers are now trying to keep students engaged while not being in the same space. This is one of the many challenges that we as educators and families need to work on together. We are worried that too many students are gaming or doing other online things while the instruction is happening. There is a blurry line here between school and home and our young learners need the adults to guide them down the right path. Smart phones, Youtube and gaming would not be allowed in the classroom if we were in school, and we still are not allowing them in our lessons. If TCGIS students are using school issued devices, the school can help keep an eye on what they are using their devices for. We can not support parents as easily when students use their own devices. Zoom Fatigue

TCGIS chose this model of learning because of a strong belief in the social interaction and solid teacher instruction that can happen in a synchronous virtual classroom. However, we are aware of the challenges that this model will present. We are up against camera anxiety, Zoom fatigue, and general inability to sit still. Please give your child grace and expect some days to be easier than others. We're all hearing the importance of building in movement in the day. Our teachers are working in Jumping Jacks, Go Noodle, Scavenger Hunts and Brain Breaks in the middle of Zoom lessons. Consider your families' ability to do a walk mid day. I recommend having a device free work area--other than the TCGIS issued Chromebook. Instead try to set up a fidget basket or invest in some good lollipops and chewing gum. Practice the TCGIS value of challenge and support. Our students have challenges that we never expected until the pandemic hit. Let's give them as much support as we can.
